## Foreword



It is my great pleasure to present the 2024 International Report of the University of Vienna. In a year marked by geopolitical tensions, global conflicts, and political instability, the University of Vienna has remained dedicated to maintaining and expanding its international collaborations. This reflects our commitment to global engagement, academic excellence, and cross-cultural exchange, which collectively contribute to our strong performance in international university rankings. The University of Vienna has made consistent progress in these rankings, further solidifying its reputation as a leading academic institution.

At the core of our internationalisation efforts are **strategic partnerships**, which foster long-term collaborations with leading institutions worldwide to create opportunities for innovative research, academic mobility, and interdisciplinary exchange.

A notable highlight of this year was the **symposium on global health** with our Strategic Partner **Kyoto University**, held in June 2024 in Vienna. This event brought together leading researchers from both institutions to discuss pressing global challenges and explore innovative solutions.

Another notable development was the deepening of the collaboration with our Strategic Partner **University of Chicago**. The opening of the University of Chicago's **Paris Center** in November 2024, along with the launch of new joint initiatives, will further strengthen our joint research programmes and facilitate faculty exchange, enriching our international academic community.

The Central European network **CENTRAL** recently celebrated its 10th anniversary. While the University of Vienna is transitioning its coordinating role to Charles University in Prague, it will continue to play an active role in the network. This smooth transition marks the start of the next phase of this intensive collaboration among leading Central European universities, and it guarantees the continued success of cooperative research initiatives, interdisciplinary projects, and academic exchanges across the region. Noteworthy highlights included the **CENTRAL Leadership Program**,

in which graduate students visited cities such as Warsaw, Berlin, Prague, Vienna, and Budapest to develop leadership skills and explore cultural diversity, as well as the anniversary conference **Imagining Central Europe**, which brought together over 50 researchers to discuss cultural and political developments in the region.

The European University Alliance **Circle U.** offers valuable opportunities for students, faculty, and researchers to collaborate across borders and remains a cornerstone of our internationalisation strategy. Circle U. fosters a spirit of innovation and interdisciplinarity in higher education. In Circle U., the University of Vienna is committed to promoting research collaboration and increasing the support for PhD candidates and postdoctoral researchers. In parallel, we are continuously innovating and internationalising our educational offerings, with a focus on developing short-term, credit-bearing courses that provide flexible learning opportunities for students.

In recent years, the University of Vienna has established **18 internationally recognised Doctoral Schools**, which have attracted a considerable number of international PhD students. These schools contribute to a vibrant international research environment, foster interdisciplinary collaboration and support the development of early-career researchers. The University of Vienna is also continually expanding its offerings for postdoctoral researchers, with a particular focus on providing career guidance and fostering a sense of community. We currently support approximately 1,100 postdocs across our various departments. Collectively, the Doctoral Schools and the newly established Postdoctoral Programme underscore the university's unwavering dedication to promoting academic excellence and facilitating long-term career progression for its researchers.

We hope you find the report enjoyable.

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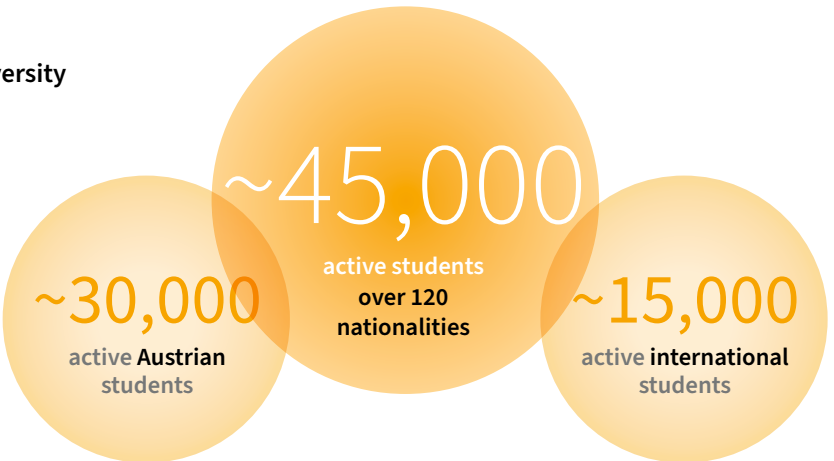

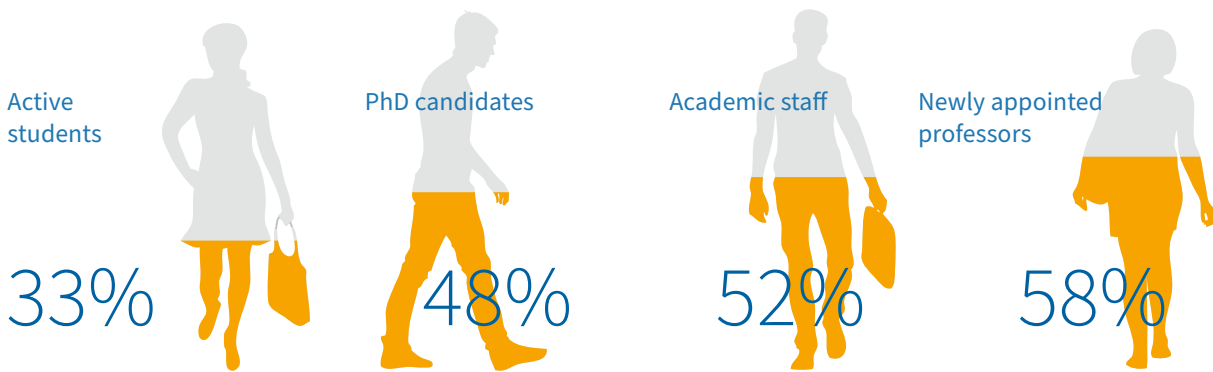


**Excellence in Research: ERC Grants and Nobel Prize**

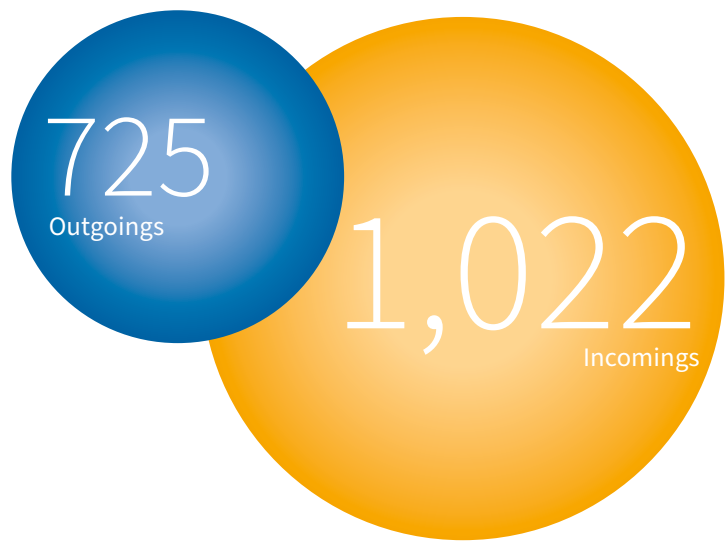

**Erasmus+ Programme (2023/24)**



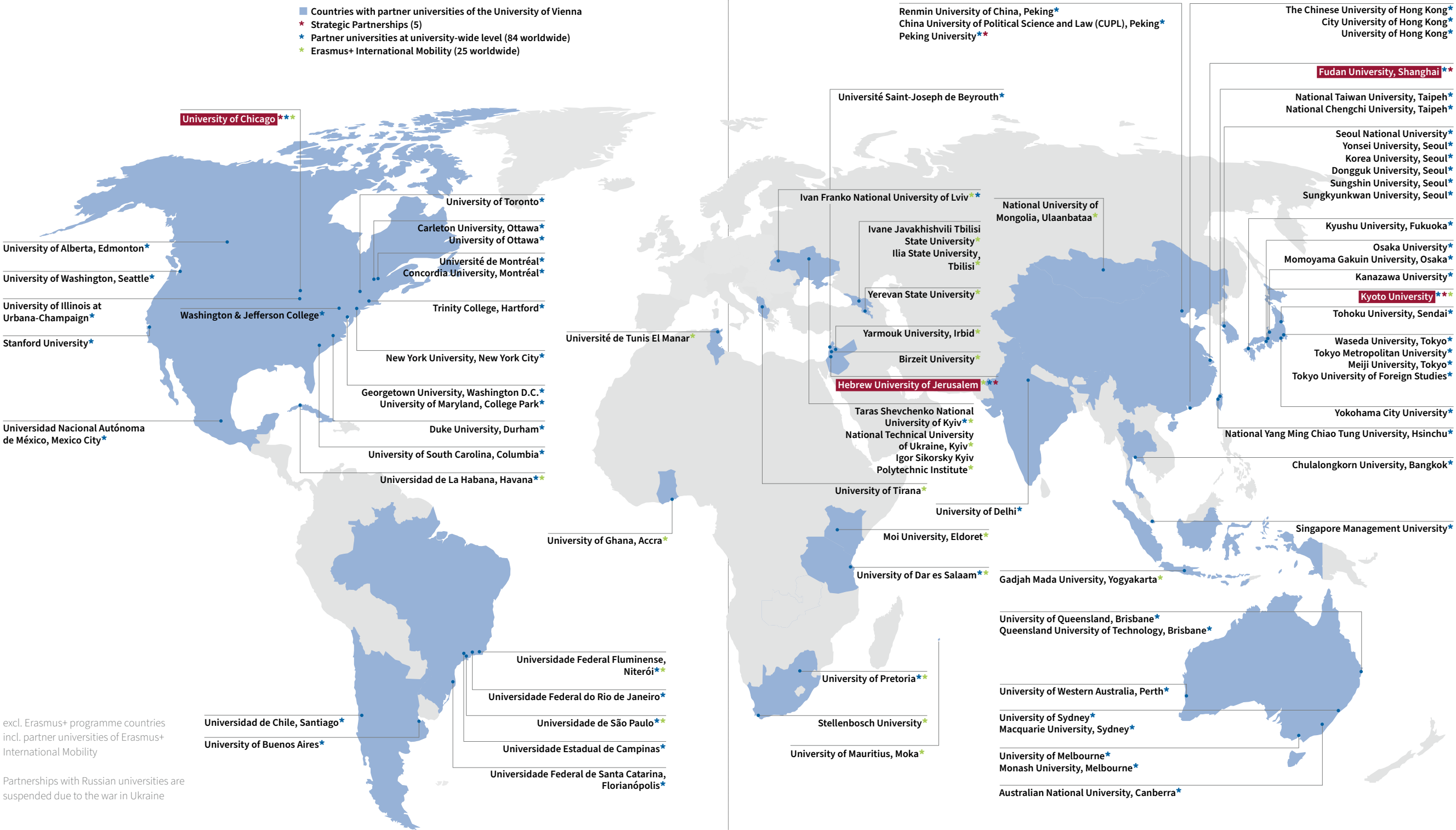

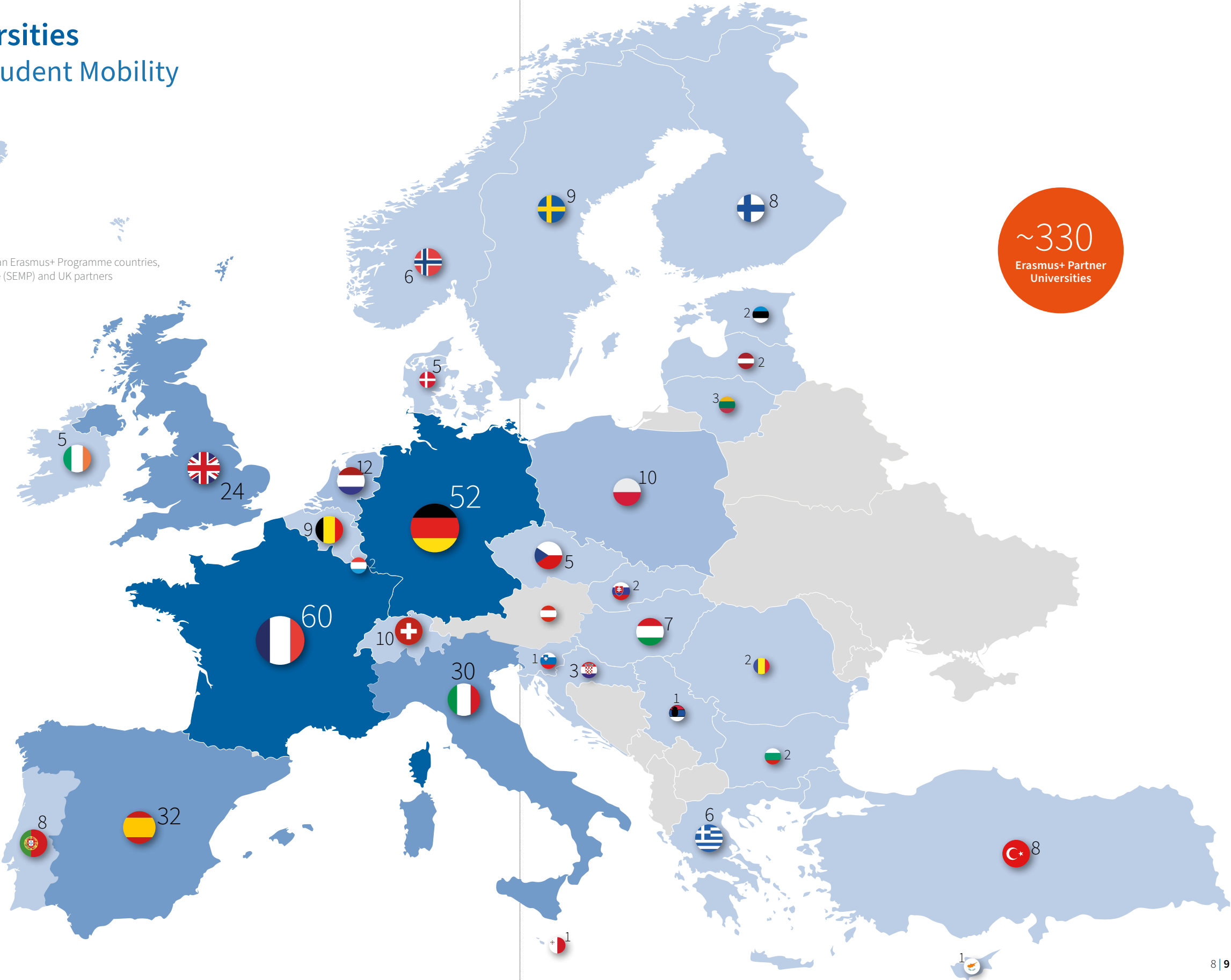

# Highlights from the International Office 2024

The focus of internationalisation activities in 2024, in addition to efforts within Strategic Partnerships, remained on participation in European networks, particularly the Circle U. Alliance and the CENTRAL Network.

## CENTRAL Network

The CENTRAL Network celebrated its 10th anniversary, with the University of Vienna passing its coordinating role to Charles University in Prague while remaining an active member. Highlights included the anniversary conference “Imagining Central Europe,” featuring over 50 researchers, and the CENTRAL Leadership Program, which took 28 Master’s and PhD students through Central European cities. Fourteen CENTRAL workshops on cultural-historical and interdisciplinary topics were held, complemented by a sports event in Prague.



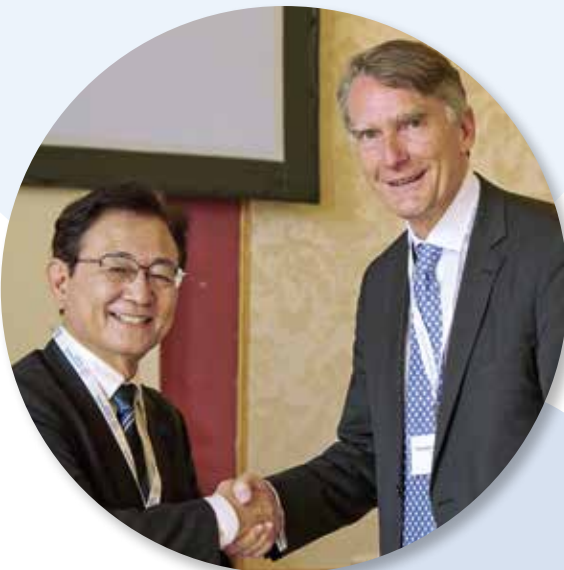
## Circle U.

As part of the European University Alliance Circle U., the University of Vienna focused on fostering joint research collaborations, supporting early-career researchers, internationalising the curriculum, and diversifying mobility programs. In 2024, three projects under the Circle U. Seed Funding Scheme were led by the University of Vienna, and students made extensive use of the Alliance’s educational and event offerings (e.g., summer schools, the Entrepreneurial Change-Making Course, the CU.lympics event, and the Circle U. Model United Nations). Digital mobility formats were also utilised and further developed within Circle U. Additionally, the University of Vienna, as a work package lead, coordinated the development of new mobility programs for early-career researchers.



## Strategic Partnerships

The University of Vienna intensified its scientific collaborations with strategic partner universities in 2024 through mobility and project funding. Notable among these efforts is the collaboration with the University of Chicago through the opening of the John W. Boyer Center in Paris, which serves as a platform for joint events and pilot projects. Another highlight was the symposium on global health held with Kyoto University. During the event, the university leadership and leading scientists from both universities discussed the topic of global health from the perspectives of microbiology, mathematical biology, medicine, social psychology, and more. As part of the Joint Research Grant Program between the University of Vienna and the Hebrew University of Jerusalem, one project grant each was awarded in the fields of social sciences and economics. The partnership with Fudan University was extended and deepened through a workshop on applied mathematics and data science.



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# Key Figures for Internationalisation Activities at the University of Vienna

Since 2008, internationalisation at the University of Vienna has been measured by a set of indicators relating to the areas of study and teaching, staff and research. The figures given are an attempt to quantify central aspects of internationalisation in these areas and to permit an annual comparison of the development of internationalisation activities.

## Degree-seeking Students

### Active students at the University of Vienna by country of origin

(Academic year 2022/23)

This important indicator measures the share of non-Austrian students in order to determine how attractive the University of Vienna is for international students as a place of education and research. **International students** constitute **33% of all active students** (> 16 ECTS), a slight increase compared to the previous year (2021/22: 32%), [see figure 1b](#).

A Bachelor's, diploma or Master's programme is considered active if the student has acquired at least 16 ECTS credits in the respective academic year. A student may be enrolled in more than one active programme during the applicable academic year. Doctoral students are not included in these figures.

Students at the University of Vienna come from more than 120 countries. 90% of all active foreign students are from Europe, 6% from Asia, about 1% each from North and Latin America and Africa, and a handful of students from Australia/Oceania. The majority (56%) are from neighbouring countries. German students make up 40% of foreign students, while students from the Western Balkans account for over 8%.

Academic year 2022/23

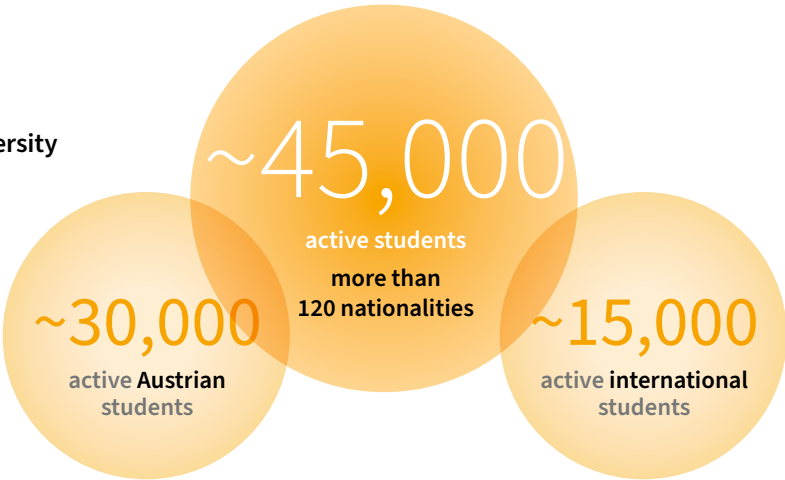

academic years 2019/20–2022/23

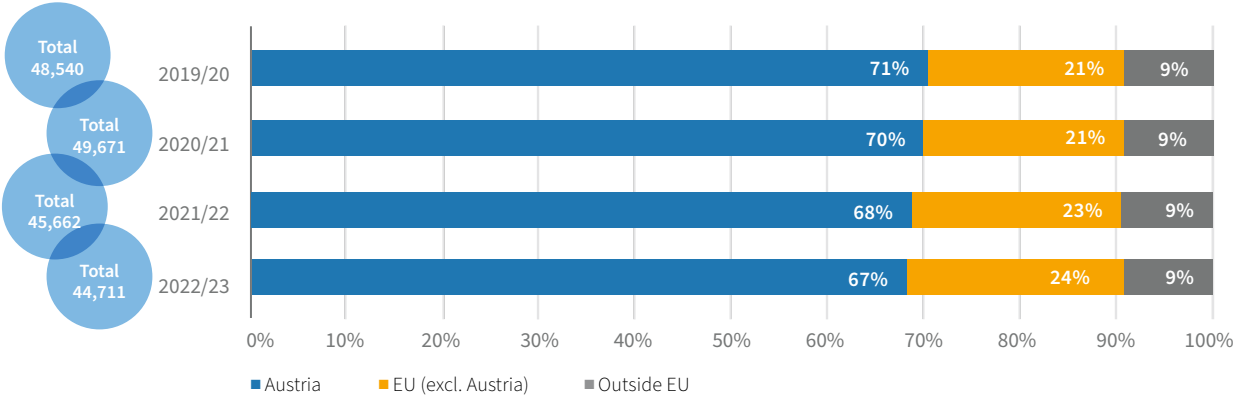

In 2023/24, we had in total 5,298 doctoral students (including students from outside doctoral schools), of which 48% come from abroad (see figure 2). Every year we have around 800 newly admitted doctoral students, who are selected through a quality-based admission procedure.

## Doctoral Schools at the University of Vienna

Training the next generation of researchers and supporting young talent to become independent and internationally competitive is a central mission of the University of Vienna. At present, the university hosts 18 doctoral schools that offer early-stage researchers the opportunity to participate in cutting-edge research within structured programmes. These doctoral schools attract young talent from all over the world. In total, we currently have 3,333 doctoral students in the schools.

PhD candidates benefit from excellent hosting conditions, e.g. quality team supervision and funding opportunities. This enables them to carry out excellent research and prepares them for a wide range of careers and responsibilities.

## univie: summer/winter schools

univie: summer/winter schools are short programmes (one to four weeks) offered during the lecture-free periods in February and from July to September. They are open to international and local students, with a focus on those studying towards a master's or doctoral degree. With the exception of the bilateral language schools, all programmes are offered in English.

univie: summer/winter schools are based on faculty initiatives and faculty research interests, while a certification process carried out by the International Office ensures that the short programmes meet the university's quality standards.

In the academic year 2023/24, one univie: winter schools and 17 univie: summer schools took place (nine short programmes in the humanities/social sciences, one in natural sciences, and seven bilateral language schools). The majority of participants were international students (~70%). 11 schools were held in Austria, and five abroad. One summer school took students to Austria, Serbia and Greece over a period of ten days. All univie: summer/winter schools are back to an on-campus setting with hybrid options available for some schools.

## Postgraduate Center: continuing education programmes

Apart from bachelor's, master's and doctoral programmes, the University of Vienna also offers a broad range of professional education programmes including continuing education master's programmes and certificate courses. The Postgraduate Center is the university's competence centre for professional continuing education and lifelong learning. Its aim is to support people on their personal educational and career paths. It offers programmes in the fields of education and social care, health and natural sciences, international affairs and business, communication and media, and law.

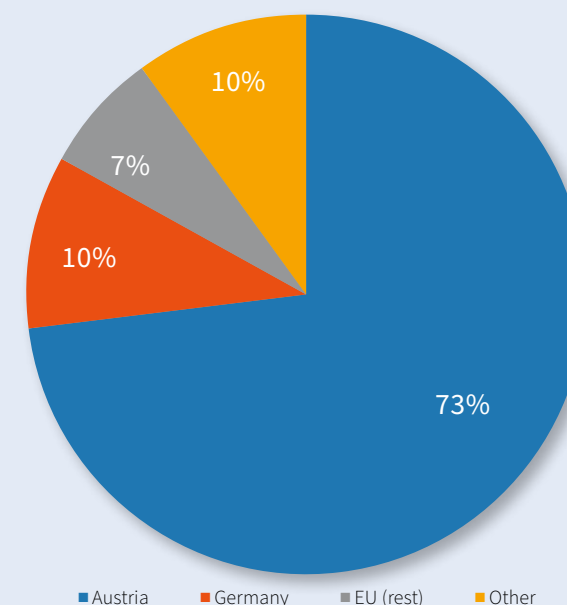
Most of the continuing education programmes can be completed in a part-time and hybrid format. Participants can choose from around 70 programmes. All programmes are research-based, interdisciplinary, high-quality, international and practice-oriented. A small-group setting enhances the practice-oriented teaching methods. In addition to theoretical, practical and skill-improving learning, participants build a personal network in their future field of work. Currently about 2,900 students attend a professional education programme at the University of Vienna.

For example, students of the master's programme "European and International Business Law" (LL.M) have the opportunity to participate in a student exchange with Stanford Law School or Santa Clara Law School in Silicon Valley, California. Furthermore, the Postgraduate Center offers extension lectures and workshops free of charge as open learning formats. They are a contribution of the University of Vienna to our knowledge society and successful lifelong learning.

**Credit Mobility** Credit mobility can be defined as a limited period of study or traineeship abroad (in the framework of on-going studies at a home institution) for the purpose of gaining credits. After the mobility phase, students return to their “home institution” to complete their studies.

**Graduates of the University of Vienna 2021/22 with stays abroad during their studies**

In a survey, Statistics Austria asked all 9,298 students who graduated in the academic year 2021/22 whether they had studied abroad during their studies. 894 (10%) had spent time abroad during their studies. This represents a further decrease in the percentage of graduates with experience abroad during their studies (2020/21: 13%), see figure 4a.

The pandemic-related global travel restrictions that began in spring 2020 presumably play a significant role in the renewed decline in this key figure. In order to re-invigorate mobility after the pandemic, Erasmus+ has introduced new short term mobility programmes, in some cases in combination with virtual components (e.g. Blended Intensive Programmes, see page 19).

With regard to the number of graduates from the various disciplines, graduates of social sciences and humanities were the most mobile. Although the social sciences registered a slight increase in total numbers, percentage wise there has been a decline in mobility in all disciplines compared to the previous year.

The stage of studies and the type of curricula significantly influence the probability of a stay abroad. Generally speaking, it can be observed that a higher percentage of graduates from diploma, Master’s and doctoral programmes complete a stay abroad than graduates from Bachelor’s programmes, see figure 4b. This can easily be explained by tighter curricula at Bachelor’s level and the students’ ambitions to complete their studies within the shortest possible time.

**Erasmus+ student mobility**



The university offers several mobility programmes for students that allow them to spend one or two semesters at a partner university. The best-known programme is the Erasmus+ Student Mobility Programme (for periods of study abroad in Europe). In recent years, the University of Vienna has been among the top European universities in terms of numbers of outgoing and incoming students within this programme. Mobility numbers for student exchange within Europe are mostly back to pre-pandemic levels. The total number of outgoing students decreased from 814 (in 2022/23) to 725 (in 2023/24). The number of incoming students shows a slight increase to a total of 1,022 (in 2023/24) compared to 988 (in 2022/23).

**Blended Intensive Programmes (“BIPs”)**

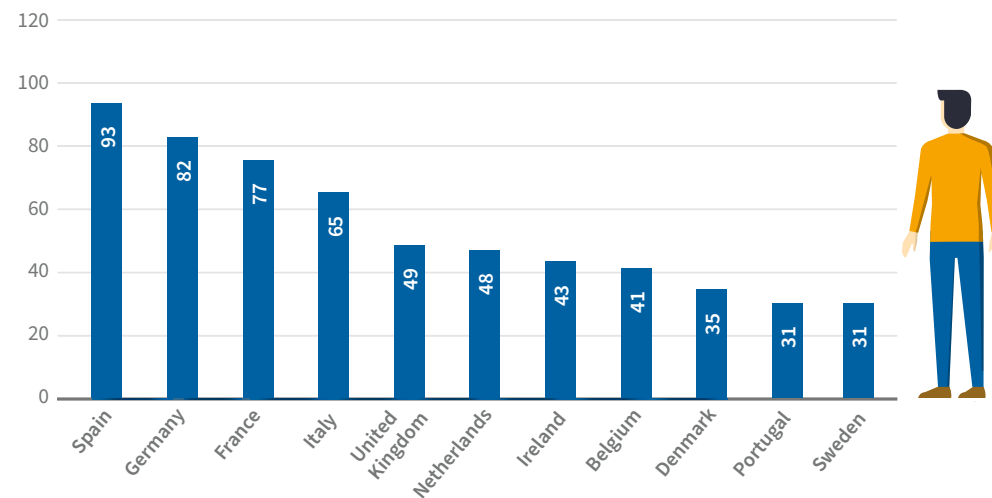
The new Erasmus+ programme generation (2021–2027) includes opportunities for blended mobility, e.g. the new Blended Intensive Programmes (BIPs). These initiatives have greatly profited from the breadth of experience gained during the pandemic in terms of distance learning. In the academic year 2023/24 the University of Vienna participated in 16 such BIPs in different disciplines with more than 100 outgoing students to partner universities in Germany, Romania, Czechia, Norway, Portugal, Cyprus, Ireland and Belgium. We expect that virtual mobility, especially blended mobility with online and face to-face phases at a host university, will continue to increase.

\* including Switzerland (SEMP; Swiss-European Mobility programme)

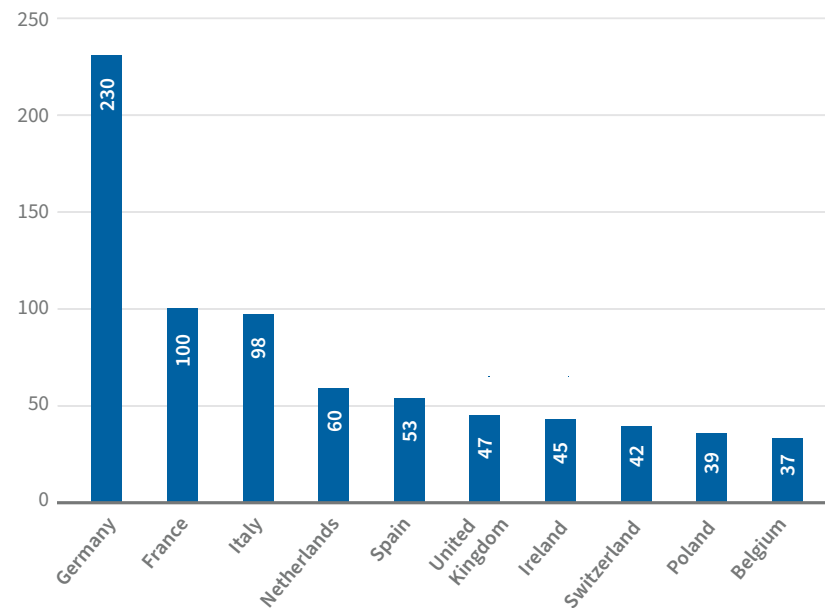

725 students of the University of Vienna benefitted from an Erasmus+ stay abroad in 2023/24. The most popular destinations in the Erasmus+ Student Mobility Programme are Spain, Germany, France, and Italy; these countries account for over 40% of all outgoing students [see figure 5a](#).

\* including Switzerland (SEMP; Swiss-European Mobility programme)

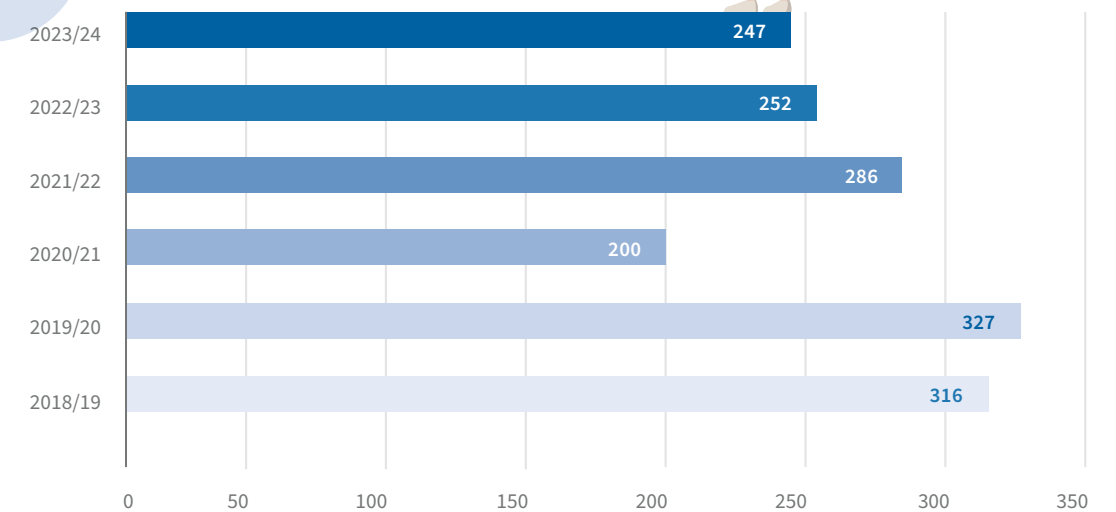

1,022 international students studied at the University of Vienna under the Erasmus+ Student Mobility Programme in 2023/24. The top 5 countries are: Germany, France, Italy, the Netherlands and Spain. 53% of all incoming Erasmus+ students come from these five countries, [see figure 5b](#).

## Erasmus+ traineeships

Within the Erasmus+ programme, students of the University of Vienna can also apply for a scholarship for a self-organised traineeship relevant to their studies in one of the European countries which participate in the Erasmus+ programme. The constant popularity of this programme can be explained by its flexibility: applications are possible all year long (no application deadlines), the time required for processing applications is short, and students can choose how long their traineeship will be (at least 2 months). After seeing a significant drop in application numbers in 2020/21 due to the Covid-19 pandemic, the number of submitted applications for Erasmus+ traineeships has recovered since. However, current numbers still lag behind pre-pandemic levels, [see figure 6](#). In 2023/24, 247 students did an internship abroad. Germany continues to be the most popular destination, where more than 40% of all internships were carried out. Spain and France complete the top 3.

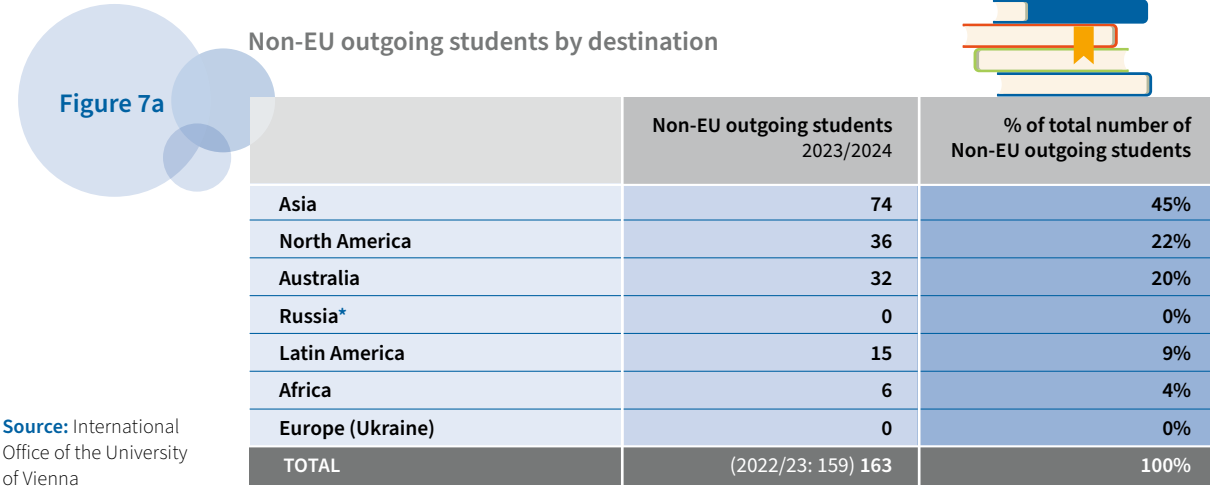

Non-EU Student Exchange Program

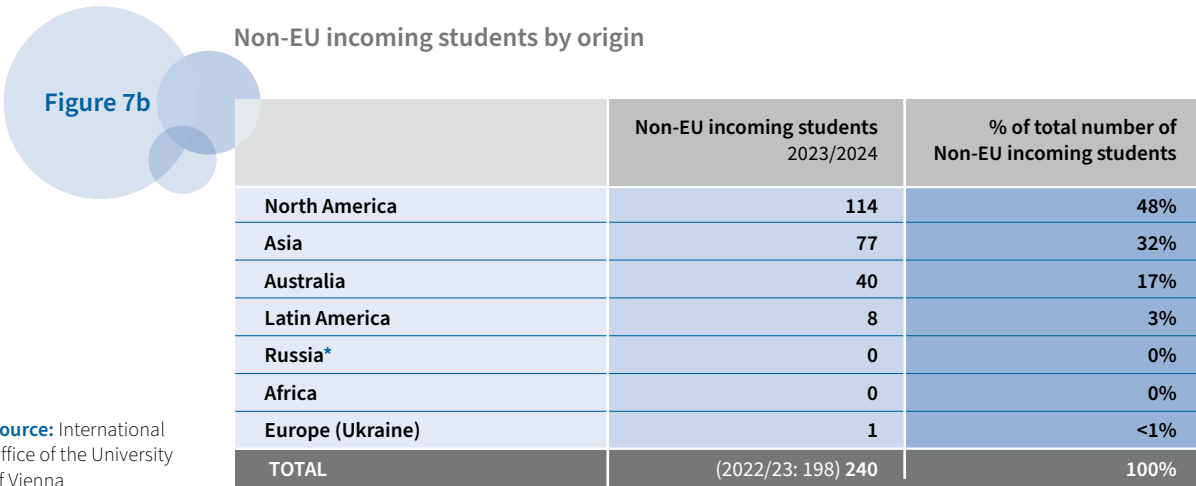
An important element of the University of Vienna’s mobility programmes is the Non-EU Student Exchange Program. This scheme has supported student exchange since 1992 with universities outside of the EU. With 163 students of the University of Vienna spending time overseas in the academic year 2023/24, the numbers of outgoing exchanges within this programme now exceeds pre-pandemic levels (2019/20: 151), whereas 240 incoming students studied at the University of Vienna under this programme, also exceeding the pre-pandemic level (pre-pandemic level: 2019/20: 228), see figures 7a and 7b.

The most popular destinations are Asia and North America, which account for 66% of all outgoing students within the Non-EU Exchange Program. Exchange to Australia has fully resumed and ranks among the top 3 destinations again. We were also able to welcome numerous incoming students from Australia. Exchanges with China have recovered after pandemic-related restrictions were lifted. However, due to the ongoing Russian invasion and resulting war in Ukraine in addition to the volatile situation in the Middle East (Israel, Lebanon), exchanges to these countries have been suspended for the time being.

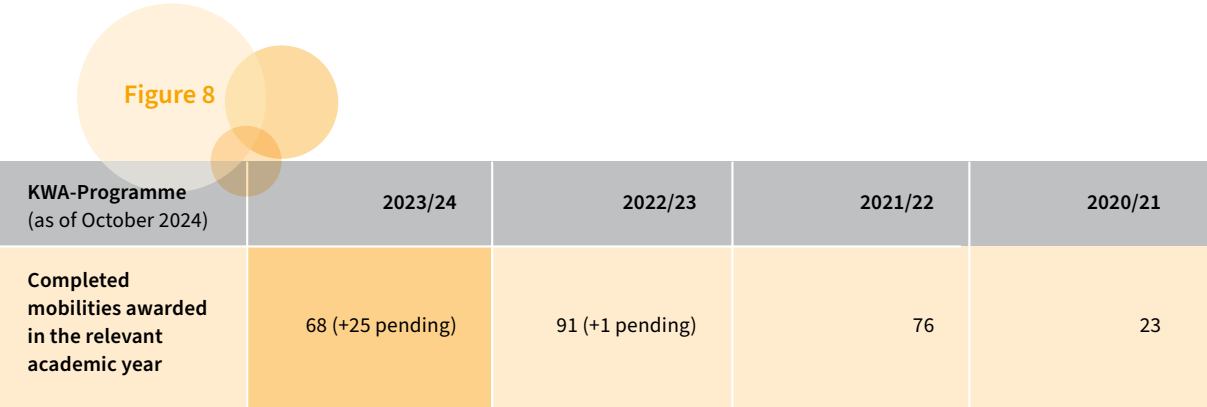

Short Term Grants Abroad (“KWA-Programme“)

The KWA-Programme (short-term grants abroad) provides funding for Master’s and PhD students if they need to conduct research (e.g. laboratory work, field studies, research in archives, libraries, academic collections, etc.) outside Austria as part of their diploma/ master’s thesis or dissertation (duration: between 2 weeks and 3 months).

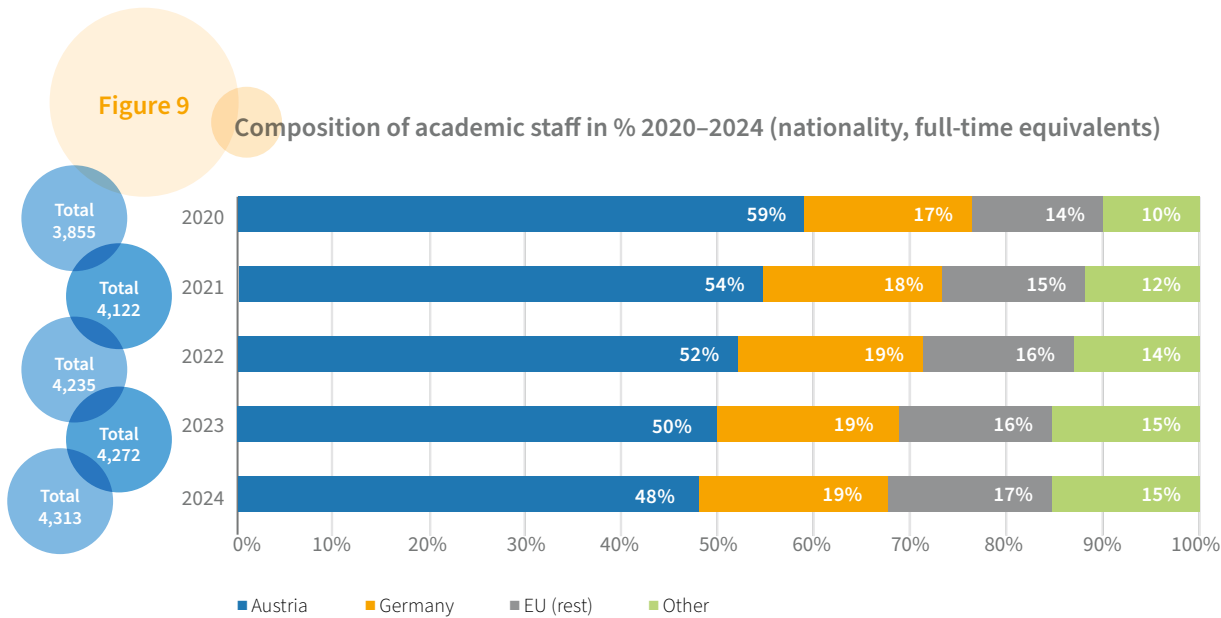

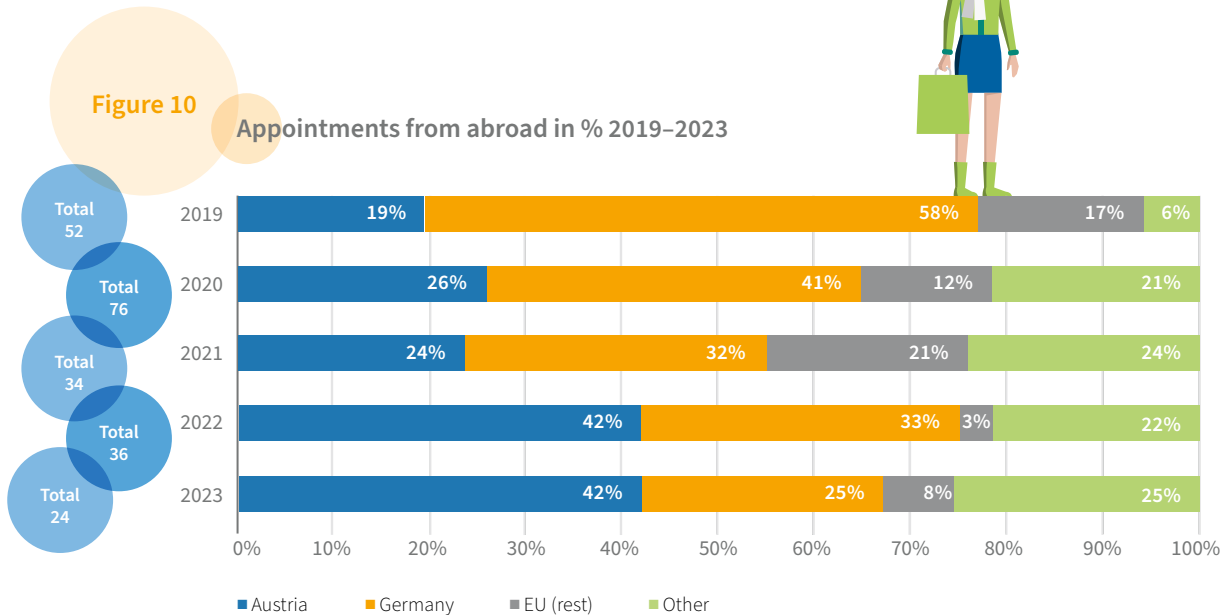
In the academic year 2023/24, 93 students of the University of Vienna were awarded a KWA grant to conduct research abroad for their final thesis. This represents a constant level compared to the last academic year, but an increase of approximately 18% compared to 2021/22. Of the 93 scholarships awarded in the current academic year, 48 are already completed and 25 are still pending, see figure 8. Students conducted research through the KWA programme in 40 different countries in the academic year 2023/24, most of them in the United States (13), Germany (8) and Italy (7).

# Teaching and Staff

Over the last few years, the share of international academic staff has risen steadily. Currently, half of academic staff come from outside Austria, [see figure 9](#).

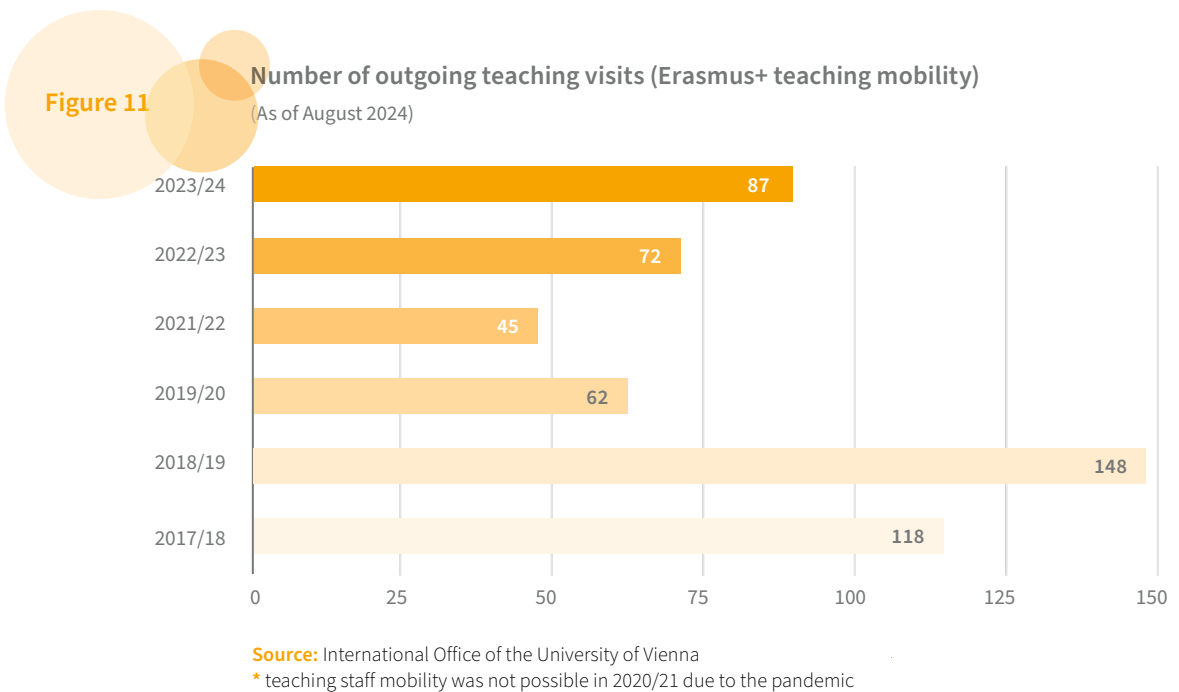

58% of the professors appointed in 2023 were appointed from universities or other institutions abroad, clearly demonstrating that, in this regard, the University of Vienna has achieved its goal of becoming attractive to international academics. Over a third of all appointments were from EU countries other than Austria (with a significant emphasis on Germany) and 25% were from outside the EU, [see figure 10](#).

## Erasmus+ teaching mobility

Erasmus+ teaching mobility is one of the core mobility schemes in the Erasmus+ programme. It offers short term teaching visits for the University of Vienna’s teaching staff to Erasmus+ universities in the EU. After the slump during the pandemic, interest in the programme has noticeably increased again. However, mobility numbers remain well below pre-pandemic levels. A total of 87 teaching mobilities were carried out in 2023/24 (58% of mobilities carried out in 2018/19).



## Erasmus+ staff training mobility

The Erasmus+ staff training programme gives university staff the opportunity to acquire work-related knowledge in other Erasmus+ programme countries. In 2023/24, the number of Erasmus+ training mobilities increased from max. 20 annually in the past to 77. The main reasons for this increase are the opening of the programme to academic staff at UNIVIE in autumn 2023 (previously, only administrative staff could participate), and the increased cooperation with partner universities in the Circle U. Alliance. 29 of the mobilities had Circle U. universities as their destination in connection with administration, research, and teaching.



Partnerships

Currently, the University of Vienna has a set of 84 partners at university-wide level, see figure 12. Bilateral university-wide partners include the five strategic partner universities: the Hebrew University of Jerusalem, the University of Chicago, Kyoto University, Fudan University and Peking University. Further partners outside Europe include, among others: Stanford University, University of Queensland, University of Toronto and Seoul National University.

The University of Vienna follows an internationalisation strategy which involves developing only a limited number of partnerships, but ensuring that these are of high impact. At university-wide level, the University of Vienna strives for cooperation with top-class universities in Asia, North America, Australia and Europe. In addition to the academic reputation of the partner university, common research and teaching interests and existing faculty links are a prerequisite for the conclusion of an agreement with a partner university.

In Europe, the strategic focus of the University of Vienna's cooperation is on multilateral strategic partnership networks, such as the CENTRAL network (Eötvös Loránd University Budapest, Humboldt-Universität zu Berlin, Charles University Prague, University of Warsaw, University of Vienna) and Circle U., a European University Alliance with eight other research-intensive partner universities from across Europe (Aarhus University, Humboldt-Universität zu Berlin, King's College London, Université de Paris, University of Belgrade, University of Louvain, University of Oslo and University of Pisa).

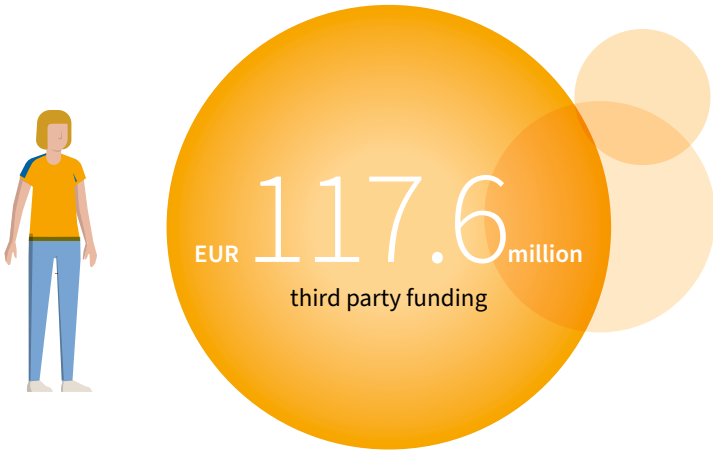

The University of Vienna was more successful than ever in attracting R&D projects in 2023. This can be seen as proof of our researchers' increased efforts to acquire third-party funding, but also as the result of the appointment of numerous top researchers. The revenues from R&D projects climbed to a record level of EUR 117.6 million – an increase of EUR 10.1 million or 9,3% compared to 2022, see figure 13.



International co-publications

The strong international orientation of research at the University of Vienna is reflected in the number of international co-publications (see figure 14a and b). The number of international co-publications (Web of Science) remains high (2023: 71.5% International co-publications, constituting a top score in an international benchmark).

## Publications (ARPPBC inkl. ESCI) with international co-authors in the Web of Science

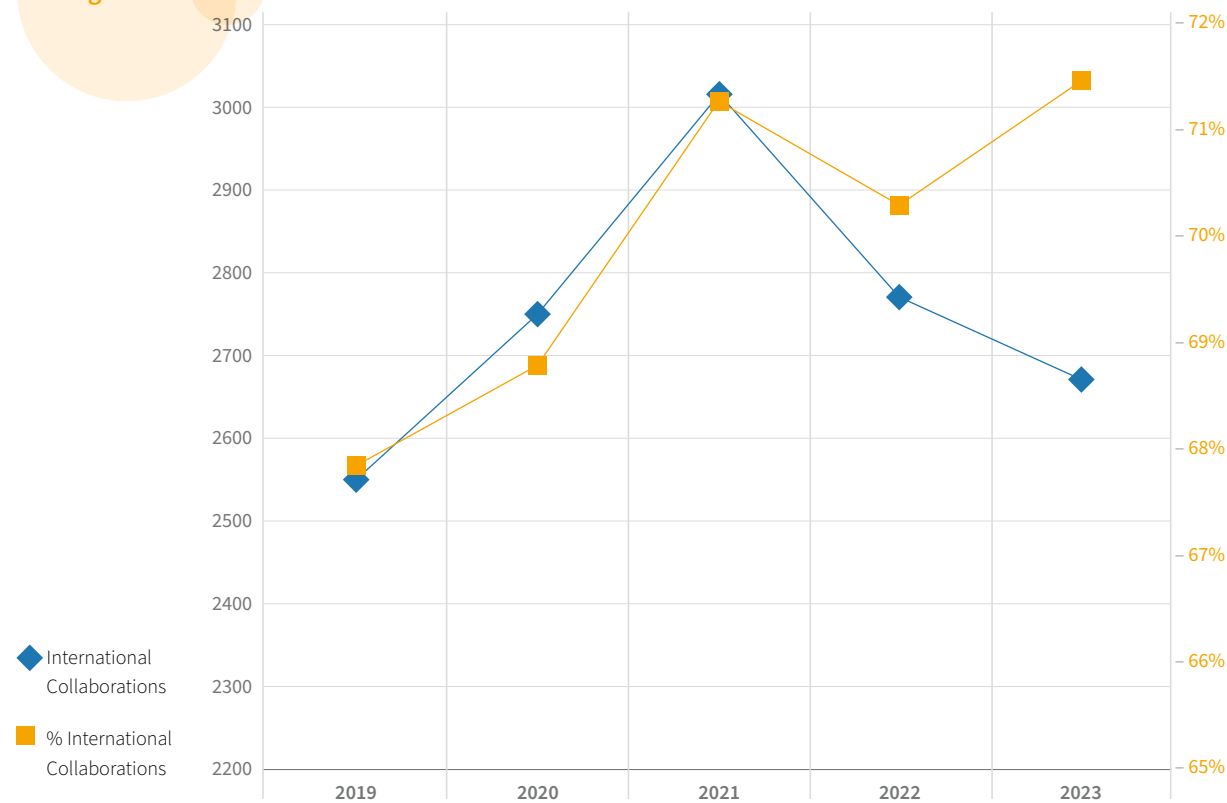
